Use of fixed pitches to differentiate words

The following is an example from Chinese. mā level tone mother má rising tone hemp mă falling and rising tone horse mà falling tone scold

Native speakers of tonal languages can often be *identified by* the musical nature of their English pronunciation.



### **INTONATION**

The use of pitch to convey meaning as in distinguishing between a statement and a question





You're cold. (Sorry I didn't notice. I'll turn on the heat right away!)



Intonation is not necessarily the same across languages.



#### STRESS

#### A combination of pitch, loudness, and vowel length

présent (n.) The present was wrapped in red paper.

presént (v.) It is time to present the award.
